January JumpStart 2022 A partial history of the Philadelphia Chapter's Educational Enterprises From Jeff Fowler

The Philadelphia Chapter (or the Pennsylvania Chapter as it was known from 1902-1960) has a long history of offering educational events to its members, incorporating such activity into its mission early on. Classes and seminars providing instruction for organists taking the exams for AGO certification (originally a requirement for membership) were its first offerings.

In the ongoing attempt to improve what many believed to be the sorry state of church music, the chapter began to offer evening seminars. In October and November 1947, for example, the "School on Church Music for Organists, Choirmasters, Clergymen, and Laymen" convened on six consecutive Monday evenings from 7:30 to 9:30 at First Unitarian Church on Chestnut Street. Each session addressed specific topics such as "denominational problems", "The Organ- its mechanics, its tone, its use" and how to conduct a volunteer choir rehearsal, to mention a few.

In 1972 the chapter held a week-long summer conference that resembled a mini-convention entitled Krisheim, named for the estate in Chestnut Hill where the event was held. It was a very successful undertaking and became an annual summer event throughout the '70s. But by 1979, its time had passed, and as Krisheim VIII (July 15-19, 1979) had lost money, the conferences were discontinued.

The idea for a January workshop originated in 1983 when Dennis Elwell and Paul Danilewski organized "January Potpourri" at Overbrook Presbyterian where Dennis was Director of Music. The event was well attended, and as a consequence January workshops were programmed by the chapter for the next four seasons. In 1988 the chapter convened a two-day January Organ Institute at Bryn Mawr Presbyterian. There were then no January conferences until 1995 when "Winter Warm-ups", a workshop addressing church music and professional concerns was put on by the chapter. The January 1996 workshop was similarly charged but termed for the first time, "January JumpStart". The moniker would be shelved until 2004. "A Winter Workshop a Saturday of practical workshops and discussions" was the way the affair was described in 1997. A January workshop at Proclamation Presbyterian in 1999 was simply titled "Chapter Workshop". Assorted educational seminars unwed to any particular month of the year were part of the chapter's programming over the years. Many coincided with the launch of the fall season.


The JumpStart scheduled for January 15, 2022 will be the 18th consecutive such conference (except for 2021 canceled by the pandemic). The first JumpStart of this series was held January 17, 2004 at Overbrook thanks again to the good graces of the church and Dennis Elwell. It featured the author Craig Whitney whose new book "All the Stops" had just been released. The credit for the JJs which followed belongs to many chapter members who worked behind the scenes, but especially to Katherine Reier ('06, '07, '08, '09) and Sue Petura ('10, '11, '12) who almost single handedly organized and chaired those workshops.

If imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, then the chapter should have been full of pride when about ten years ago "January Jubilee", a program strikingly similar to "January Jumpstart", was introduced by AGO National. In an apparent nod to the chapter's success, the AGO thereby institutionalized and packaged a construct for chapters across the country to stage their own January workshop like Philadelphia's.

So... mark your calendar now for January JumpStart XVIII, Saturday, January 15, 2022.

"Inspired Sound: Philadelphia's Pipe Organ Heritage", a photography exhibit. In 2015, photographer Joseph E. B. Elliott was commissioned by Partners for Sacred Places to document seven churches in Kensington. Another commission came in 2019 to photograph nearly fifty churches and organs that were part of the Playing and Preserving Project. In his work Elliott explored and photographed scores of fascinating structures and the organs within them. His approach combined the visual experience of space, light, and detail of historic religious spaces with the exploration of the hidden, intricate mechanical workings of the instruments. He captured the full range of care and use of organs, from polished beauty to loss of interest and disrepair of instruments that will never be played again.

January JumpStart will be held throughout the facility (2, 3, 4, and 5 on the diagram.) Registration and coffee/tea will be in the Ministries Center (2) beginning at 8:30 AM. We will start the day together at 9:00 AM in the Sanctuary (3) with a lively hymn sing, lead by David Cherwien and Susan Palo Cherwien.

Our lunch is expected to be a boxed meal depending on Covid protocols at the time. Eileen Hunt, former VP of National AGO, will deliver a talk on a topic relevant to the industry. For those interested in social issues facing women organists, Dr. Hunt will offer a session immediately afterwards.

If you are interested in choirs, there will be sessions for SATB choir presented by Chapter member Jeff Brillhart, Director of Music and Fine Arts at BMPC and on the faculty of Yale University. For smaller, or SAB choirs, the sessions will be given by Mark Miller, Lecturer in Sacred Music also at Yale. In addition, nationally-hailed hymn writer Susan Palo Cherwien will present "Marriage of Text and Tune."

More organ-focused sessions include a hymn playing class by David Cherwien. Shelly Moorman-Stahlman, Professor of Music at Lebanon Valley College, is slated for an intro to the console geared to those less familiar with organ playing. Another more detailed session on the technical aspects of the instrument is currently being finalized.

Right after the morning hymn sing, a masterclass will feature Professor Renée Anne Louprette who will critique and assist several players. She will complete our formal day with a recital on the 59-stop, 89-rank Rieger Orgelbau in the Sanctuary.

Join us from 3:30 PM on, for a relaxing time of hors d'oeuvres and drinks just 1-1/2 miles down the road at Gullifty's, 1149 Lancaster Avenue, Bryn Mawr.

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IN PARADISUM

Allen George Biester JUNE 18, 1940 – AUGUST 17, 2021

Allen George Biester, age 81, of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania passed away on Tuesday, August 17, 2021. He was born June 18, 1940, raised in South New Jersey, and paid for his own music lessons as a child by doing a paper route.


Dr. Biester had a degree in German Literature & Music from the University of Virginia at Charlottesville. He taught a two colleges during his career, and also at a gymnasium in Frydek-Mistek in the Czech Republic. He held many positions as Director of Music at mainly Lutheran churches, most recently for nine years at Resurrection Lutheran Church in Oakland, CA, where he also founded and managed the Eine kleine Sonntagsmusik Concert Series. In his career, he has been a professor (German, music, philosophy, literature) a published composer, choir director and later music director at VMI. He had about 30 published compositions and numerous arrangements for instrument and choir.



He was a lover of travel...a lover of serendipity.....a lover of antiquity and all things Greek and Roman. He spoke English and German fluently, and was conversant in Czech, Italian, French and Spanish. He was an iconoclast, who cherished the music of Bach and always had a "church job" ("Where else do you find organs?"); who was in rapture at putting his hands on the very keys played by Bach.

After a 2016 engagement as recitalist with the Brno Organ Festival in the Czech Republic, Dr.Biester returned to his native Philadelphia in 2017. His specialty was organ and choral music of the German Baroque. Dr. Biester most recently served at the Glading Memorial Presbyterian Church in the Oxford Circle neighborhood of Philadelphia.

He is survived by cousins and by friends, across this country and in Europe, particularly in the Czech Republic where he lived in two different periods.

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TALE PIPES

For this month I offer a hymn history that you might find surprising – I quite enjoy digging into hymn histories, because quite often you discover incredible details and long and surprising backgrounds!

We Gather Together

Tune: KREMSER, possible 16th century Dutch folk tune Text: Unknown Author, English translation: Theodore Baker

This gentle hymn that we associate with Thanksgiving and general praise has quite a turbulent past! It was born of the struggle for independence from Spain in the Netherlands. One source writes that the Battle of Turnhout in 1597 was the inspiration for the text, and that the author was Adreanus Valerius (1575-1625), a Dutch musician, poet and composer. His work was largely a portrait of the common man, and also his nation's struggle for independence, which completely overlapped his life (the 80 Years War - 1568 - 1648.) Other sources suggest that the author was unknown, or that in celebration of the Turnhout victory worshippers gathered and together put new words to a beloved folk tune. The hymn was first printed in the 1626 Dutch patriotic songbook, "Nederlandtsch Gedencklanck." It had a very unifying message because part of the struggle against Spain and its king involved their ban to Holland on uniting for worship. Anyone who has experienced religious persecution could resonate with the text.



We gather together to ask the Lord's blessing; He chastens and hastens His will to make known. The wicked oppressing now cease from distressing. Sing praises to His Name; He forgets not His own.

Theodore Baker (1851-1934) of New York City came across the hymn while visiting Leipzig as a musicologist, and is credited with translating it into English. In 1894 he used it as special choral 'Thanksgiving Prayer,' and apparently its first publication in America came in 1903. It spread throughout denominations, and also took root as a Thanksgiving hymn. Baker worked as literary editor at G. Schirmer Music Publishers, and upon retiring moved to Dresden, Germany.

Beside us to guide us, our God with us joining, Ordaining, maintaining His kingdom divine; So from the beginning the fight we were winning; Thou, Lord, were at our side, all glory be Thine!

The tune is named after Eduard Kremser (1838-1914) who was a composer and choir director in Vienna. He is thought to have rediscovered the hymn after two centuries after it was written, and he arranged it for choir. So really, we owe Mr. Kremser our thanks for this gem!

We all do extol Thee, Thou Leader triumphant, And pray that Thou still our Defender will be. Let Thy congregation escape tribulation; Thy Name be ever praised! O Lord, make us free!
